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The Health Scourge of 2012: West Nile Virus

Hello, fellow Collie Rescue friends. The topic this month is one that has a few of us a little scared for our pets these days, no thanks to the media telling us of the fears of the virus in our dogs. The virus I speak of is the West Nile Virus (WNV) in our dogs and cats.

Here is what we know for sure. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has seen a relatively small number of West Nile Virus cases in our pets throughout the Midwest and the nation reported by veterinarians. WNV causes fever, lethargy, and mild nonspecific signs. It is unlikely that most pet owners would notice any of these signs easily. Dogs and cats become infected when bitten by an infected mosquito. Hence using animal-safe mosquito repellents is your best prevention; for example, use something like **Cedarcide PetSafe Red Cedar Insect Repellent Granules** in your area to prevent mosquitoes. There is also evidence that cats can become infected with the virus after eating infected mice; hence keeping the cats inside is best.

There is no specific treatment for West Nile Virus infection and no vaccine available. Full recovery from the infection is likely unless underlying medical issues are present. Treatment would be consistent with standard veterinary practices for animals infected with any viral agent.

If your animal becomes infected with WNV, this suggests that there are infected mosquitoes in your area. I would implore you to wear longer clothing and use a DEET repellent--if able--to protect yourself. There is no evidence of dog- or cat-to-person transmission of West Nile Virus, according to the CDC. This suggests that dog licks, feces, blood, or bites will not spread WNV from dogs to other animals or people.

So, when you hear on the news that dogs with West Nile Virus need to be destroyed, call in and inform the news people of their



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Health Alert: Parvovirus

An outbreak of canine parvovirus in the Willmar, MN (Kandiyohi County) area this month has prompted us to remind you to make sure your pet's vaccinations are current. Well over a dozen cases, including some deaths, have been reported within the last 3 weeks.

Canine parvovirus is highly contagious. It is transmitted by direct contact with the feces of an infected dog or indirectly through contaminated objects such as hands, clothing, toys, bedding, or food and water dishes. Some symptoms of the parvovirus include vomiting, lethargy, and severe bloody diarrhea. Puppies, all dogs under 1 year of age, are most susceptible to parvovirus. If left untreated, parvo is usually fatal.

Our advice is to make sure your dog is up to date on all vaccinations. Use caution when walking your pet outdoors and avoid areas where other dogs have been sick, especially if your dog hasn't been vaccinated. If your dog shows any symptoms or you have any questions, please contact your veterinarian.



error. There is no reason to destroy a pet or a rescue dog just because it has been infected with West Nile Virus; the animal will live and recover and not spread the virus. Our dogs and cats can get the virus, yes, but they do better with it than we human folks.....hence, fear the mosquito, kill and repel the mosquito, and keep us and our pets safe.

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Lou: A Thundershirt Story . . .

I adopted Lou at age 10 from MWCR in the fall of 2011. He had been given up after 10 years because his owners had a baby and Lou no longer fit into their lives. For the past 21 years I have been adopting older dogs out of rescue, so I snatched him up immediately. Lou is a beautiful, intelligent, slightly high-strung herding dog, and he came to me with over-reactive barking and a full-blown case of storm anxiety. His previous owners used to lock him in the garage to deal with his destructive behavior, and after 10 years of that treatment, his reactivity and anxiety was pretty well entrenched.

Spring is full of storms in MN, so I had the month of April 2012 to witness his fear and destructive behavior due to the stress. He would start 'ramping up' when the storm front was about 50 miles away and the barometric pressure was changing. Kenneling him was not an option, as he bent a heavy duty wire kennel trying to get out. Lou & I headed to Chuck & Don's Pet Food Outlook to buy a Thundershirt, after 2 storms this spring, and my getting absolutely no sleep during those storms, the paint scratched off a door, and a wooden arm ripped off of a bench in the front hall.

We put the Thundershirt on him in the store and IMMEDIATELY he was less high-strung. He was interested in socializing with the customers and other dogs in the store and he walked around the store displaying totally pack appropriate behavior and greeting people. It was amazing, just like someone just flipped a switch inside of him. He wore his Thundershirt periodically over the next week just to get him pattern trained to feeling calm and having that calmness associated with wearing the Thundershirt.

The next storm rolled in 5 days later and the difference in him was incredible. He paced and panted some and went into the bathroom, but he was not destructive or crazed from the stress. Each storm it continues to get better, and we now have established a routine and his safe spot for when a storm is coming. Sometimes he will walk over to where I have his Thundershirt hanging and nose it before a storm comes because he wants it on. His overall demeanor has become calmer, the reactive barking has diminished and he is now a dog aligned with his genetic hard-coding and not a basket-case victim of stress. He was my first dog who had storm anxiety, and I knew about Thundershirts, but never needed one - thank God for it!

The picture of him is outside on the deck during a light rain and he is calm and scenting the air like a normal dog. There is not a lot of dog under all that Collie fur. Bet you never knew the Butt Sisters had a brother named Lou!




We love our family and want to "THANK" MWCR for putting us together.



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
